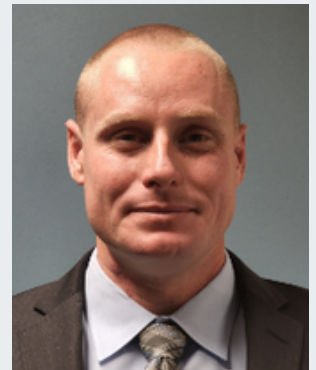

The Burbank Police will once again show its support in the fight against breast cancer throughout October by unveiling a pink-wrapped police vehicle.

This will be the sixth year that Burbank Police have participated in this event for Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The campaign will again be a team effort with Wrapix Imaging of Burbank, a company specializing in a wide variety of custom-printed vinyl graphics.



Wrapix Imaging has donated all of the vinyl wrap materials and labor. Owner Adam Sumner says the project is especially important to him and his family, who have been affected by the disease.

The pink police cruiser will be on display throughout October at various community events. The purpose behind wrapping the vehicle in pink is to draw attention and encourage regular screenings for the early detection of breast cancer.

In addition, Burbank Police have also joined the Pink Patch Project and will be selling Burbank Police pink patches throughout the month of October to raise money for City of Hope and cancer research. They can be purchased at the front counter of the Burbank Police Department for \$10 each.



Fallen Hero Remembered

September 22nd marked the anniversary of BPD Fallen Officer Richard E. Kunkle, End of Watch, September 22, 1961. As a Burbank Police Officers' Association tradition, a wreath was placed at "The Guardians" statue in honor of our fallen hero. The laying of the wreath was presented by the BPD Honor Guard. We will always honor our heroes for their service and the ultimate sacrifice they made to secure our safety.

Officer Richard "Dick" E. Kunkle was appointed as a patrolman on January 4, 1954. He was killed in

the line of duty while riding a police motorcycle on September 22, 1961. Officer Kunkle was attempting to stop a motorist in the area of Victory Boulevard and Orange Grove when he was struck by another vehicle. Officer Kunkle died from his injuries.

Prior to his service with the Burbank Police Department, Officer Kunkle served in the Armed Forces during World War II and was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge. After his military service, Officer Kunkle served four years as a police officer in Anchorage, Alaska.

Officer Kunkle's name is forever carved on the wall at the National Law Enforcement Officer Memorial. Memorial Panel: 14-W:10.



HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween is a time to celebrate and enjoy the annual traditions of dressing up in costumes and trick-or-treating for those savory treats. It is a time for fun with friends, family, and neighbors. The Burbank Police wish you a safe and Happy Halloween on October 31st.

In an effort to help the Burbank community enjoy Halloween safely, the Burbank Police Department is sharing the following tips for motorists, parents, and trick-or-treaters:

Motorists

- Please slow down, especially in residential neighborhoods, and obey all traffic signs and signals. We ask that you drive below the speed limit and be alert for children walking and crossing the street.
- Dark costumes can be hard to see, especially at night. Please be on the lookout for trick-or-treating enthusiasts and remember they may not always see you.

Parents

- Make sure small children are supervised at all times by an adult
- Plan and discuss the route your trick-or-treaters will follow and make sure to stick to it
- Encourage children to stay in groups
- Teach children to stop only at well-lit houses and to never enter a stranger's home
- Tell children not to eat any treats until they get home
- Inspect treats and get rid of any that look as though they've been opened or tampered with

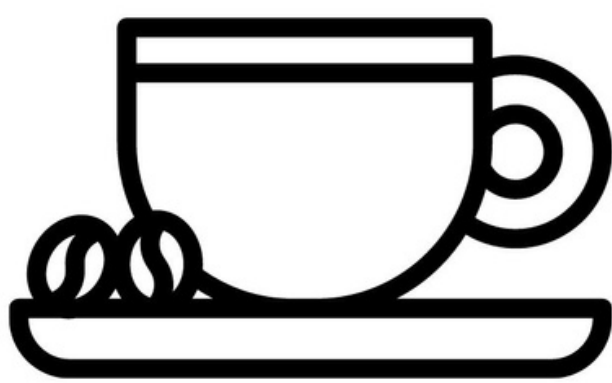
Trick-or-Treaters

- Be visible!
- Wear disguises that do not obstruct vision
- ELIMINATE distractions and avoid using cell phones or ear buds/headphones while walking
- Ensure any props are flexible and blunt-tipped to avoid injury from tripping or horseplay
- Carry a flashlight and place it face down when crossing the street to illuminate the ground and your surrounding area to alert drivers to your presence
- Have a parent or guardian inspect all treats and never consume any candy that appears to have been opened or tampered with
